## Introduction to this Resource

An individual's state of health is profoundly influenced by the resources, services, social networks, and physical environments that are accessible to them. Consequently, the community as a whole has a role to play in ensuring that all community members have equitable access to the resources and opportunities that support health and wellbeing. Adding a health chapter to your Town Plan is an important first step in identifying community health needs and developing strategies to improve quality of life for residents. A health chapter can also be used to demonstrate community commitment when applying for health project grants.

This resource was developed by Two Rivers-Ottauquechee Regional Commission and Mount Ascutney Hospital and Health Center. It presents suggested topic areas that could be incorporated into a health chapter. Under each topic area you'll find:

- A brief introduction to the topic
- Reflection questions to help inventory a Town's resources as well as identify resource gaps and inequities
- A link to a table with topically-relevant sample goal, policy, and recommendation language from adopted Town Plans around the state

## Access to Health Care and other Critical Services

Health care services and other supports like emergency response, recovery centers, and shelters are essential in the prevention, treatment, and management of illness, and in the preservation of mental and physical well-being through the services that they offer. Rural locations are typically served by small facilities or networks that can assist residents with general health care needs but are not suited for more complex acute care services that require specialized services and equipment.

If your Town does not have its own services, the plan can discuss the importance of reliable transportation to access services in nearby towns. Some towns in Vermont have a community nurse. The nurse position may be supported by private funds, public funds, or a mix. The role of a community nurse is typically to educate and assist residents with physical assessment, medication and medical equipment management, coordinating care across providers, connecting people to community resources, assisting with following health care advice, assessing safety in the home, transportation to medical appointments, and providing support to family members. Community nurses supplement and cannot replace primary and specialty medical care services. Many town nurses focus largely on the elderly population to help them age in place safely and in comfort.

- Where are the following services located?
  - Primary care
  - Mental health services
  - Dental services
  - Other kinds of specialty care, such as maternity care and substance misuse treatment and recovery services
  - Urgent / Emergency care (including emergency room and ambulance / paramedic services)
  - Health screening and other wellness services
  - Nursing care facilities, residential care facilities, and/or assisted living facilities
  - Adult day care services
  - Shelters for the unhoused
  - Cooling / heating centers during extreme weather events
  - Youth services
  - Domestic violence services
  - Restorative justice or court diversion programs
- How hard is it to use the aforementioned services if you don't have access to a car?
- Does your Town have community nursing services?
- Are caregiver respite services available to residents of your Town?
- What other barriers make it hard for people to access health care and other critical services?
- What steps have local service providers taken to meet the unique needs of those who are disproportionately impacted by societal inequities? Priority populations include but are not limited to:
  - o Low-income

- Black, Indigenous, and People of Color
- People with disabilities
- LGBTQIA+
- Refugees
- English language learners
- o People who are unhoused
- People who were formerly incarcerated

# Active Living and Active Transportation

As the built environment has become increasingly car-centric, levels of physical activity have correspondingly declined. Reduced physical activity results in a number of health problems. To counter these trends, it is necessary to make communities more conducive to physical activity once again, particularly walking and cycling. The built environment and community programming have a tremendous impact on our ability to maintain an active lifestyle. All of our residents and visitors, inclusive of all abilities, income levels, and identities, need opportunities to regularly integrate physical activity into their lives. Instead of planning solely around the needs of cars, we can create compact development patterns to promote active transportation and we can design our streets, parks, and other public spaces to be safe and welcoming places to walk and bike. The Town will establish/preserve public access to natural recreational areas and provide programs that bring residents together for exercise and sports.

- What is it like trying to access critical services (employment, school, medical care, groceries and other retail, etc) if you don't own a car or are unable to drive?
- What barriers exist that prevent or make it hard to use public transit?
- What transportation challenges are faced by those with disabilities who live in your town?
- In what areas of town do you see the most pedestrian and bike traffic?
- What areas in town are dangerous or unwelcoming for pedestrians?
- What areas in town are dangerous or unwelcoming for bicyclists?
- Are there areas in town where sidewalks are in poor condition or are missing and needed?
- Where are the places in town where people switch transportation modes (e.g. cars to biking, transit to walking, biking to transit, etc)? Does the infrastructure in those locations make it easy to switch modes?
- Are recreational areas and social activity centers accessible to those without cars? Are they
  accessible to those with disabilities?
- What barriers exist that prevent people from participating in recreational programs or other forms of physical activity?
- How easy is it to find information about local trails and how to access them (including parking)?
- Where is new housing being built, and are those locations livable for people without cars?

# Age-Friendly Environment

Age-friendly environments support the well-being and the participation of people in community life as they age. As we move through the different stages of our lives, our needs change. Do community residents have access to a variety of options that meet their changing needs in the areas of housing, food, employment, social activities and recreation, social services, etc? By creating communities where seniors can safely and happily "age in place," we create opportunities for different generations to learn from and nurture each other.

### **Questions for Reflection:**

- What housing options are available for seniors who:
  - are downsizing
  - o no longer drive
  - o cannot live alone
  - o are facing financial challenges
- What support systems are in place to help seniors live independently if they wish and are able to do so?
- What transportation options are available for seniors to access critical services (groceries and other stores, medical appointments, libraries and other gathering places, etc)? Are there challenges that make those transportation options hard to access or rely upon?
- What social opportunities and recreational programs are available to seniors?
  - o Are they accessible if you have disabilities, or if you cannot drive or don't have a car?
  - Are there inter-generational opportunities and programs?
- Does the town have public spaces where seniors can walk / exercise?
  - o Are they accessible to those with disabilities?
  - o Are they accessible and safe during the cold months?
- What support systems exist for seniors experiencing food insecurity?
- Where can seniors volunteer in the community?
- How do seniors find out about the resources and opportunities available to them?

Child Care

Child care serves as a critical component in the raising of a child or children from working families. Good quality child care helps prepare children for schooling or may even supplement a child's school curriculum, and it provides them with opportunities for socialization. Many children also rely on child care services for meals. Vermont has a program called STARS (Step Ahead Recognition System) for child care, preschool, and afterschool programs. Programs that participate in STARS are stepping ahead — going above and beyond state regulations to provide professional services that meet the needs of children and families. STARS can help parents find a quality program for their children.

## **Questions for Reflection:**

- What barriers prevent families from accessing child care in our area?
- How can the Town improve access to child care, for example:
  - Providing land, space in a community building, financing through a revolving loan fund, or other financial contributions to support the creation or expansion of a childcare facility
  - o If the Town has zoning, does the zoning support the creation of new childcare facilities?
  - Connecting residents with childcare licensing information via the Town website
  - Offering financial assistance for families facing hardship

# **Environmental Quality**

Safe air, land, and water are fundamental to a healthy community environment. An environment free of hazards, such as secondhand smoke, carbon monoxide, allergens, lead, and toxic chemicals, helps prevent disease and other health problems. Implementing and enforcing environmental standards and regulations, monitoring pollution levels and human exposures, building environments that support healthy lifestyles, and considering the risks of pollution in decision-making can improve health and quality of life.

- Have former commercial or industrial properties been properly assessed for contamination and cleaned up as needed?
- Is the community negatively affected by noise or light pollution?
- How are groundwater quality and surface water quality being protected? Are there any areas of town where water quality is poor?
- Are there abandoned or derelict buildings in Town?
- Are there buildings in Town that are at higher risk of fire than others?

# Faith, Wisdom, and Spirituality

Is your Town a place where a wide variety of traditions, values, and spiritual practices are freely expressed and are honored? Residents have the right to seek inner peace, meaning, purpose, connectedness, wisdom, and guidance for right action in their own ways. Faith- and values-based communities actively seek to understand and support one another.

### **Questions for Reflection:**

- Are there any groups that are consistently excluded from community meetings or events because of conflicts with their religious observances?
- What opportunities exist for people to build deep connections with similar-minded and different-minded people?
- How does the Town respond when acts of intolerance or hatred are perpetrated?

# Healthy Food Access and Choice

Food access is not simply a health issue but also a community development and equity issue. For this reason, access to healthy, affordable, and culturally appropriate food is a key component not only in a healthy, sustainable local food system, but also in a healthy, sustainable community. Stores, farm stands and farmers markets, community meals, food shelves, and community gardens are all opportunities to create access to healthy foods.

- Where can community members go if they need free food?
  - What kinds of foods are offered there? Is there a limit on quantity? Can a person maintain a healthy and balanced diet if they are relying upon that food source?
  - What are the hours of operation? Does the schedule pose any barriers to working adults?
  - o If the in-town options are closed, where is the next nearest location where someone can get food?
- What are the demographics of the people who rely upon local food assistance operations?
   Moreover, who is <u>not</u> going in other words, are there any demographic gaps that might indicate barriers to access?

- Do local stores and other points of sale offer a selection of affordable and healthy food? Do they accept food stamps?
- What measures are in place to ensure continued supply of food in the event of a communitywide emergency?
- Are school lunches well-balanced and nutritious?
- What supports exist for food-insecure families to feed their children when school is not in session?
- Do local residents have access to community garden space?
  - o Are there cost or knowledge barriers to participating in a community garden?
  - O How can those barriers be lowered?

# **Healthy Homes**

Housing is the best-known predictor of health. Lead exposure in old buildings can lead to significant abnormalities in cognitive development; asbestos and radon exposure can increase the chance of developing lung cancer; uncontrolled moisture, mold, pests, and other triggers cause or exacerbate asthma and other respiratory dysfunction; inadequate heat can lead to use of inappropriate heating sources potentially resulting in fires or carbon monoxide poisoning; and poorly maintained stairwells and other structures can cause injuries. The risk of falls for older adults is another healthy home concern, particularly when these adults are living in old housing stock that may have uneven floors, narrow stairs, or other potentially hazardous features. The high cost of housing places a tremendous strain on low-income households. Low-income households are also often concentrated in lower quality housing, resulting in disproportionately higher risk of harm to their health.

- What is the quality of the rental housing stock in town?
  - Have those properties been evaluated for exposure to hazardous building materials (e.g., lead paint or pipes, asbestos, mold, PCBs, etc.)?
  - What support or resources can be provided to renters and landlords to ensure that lower income community members are not disproportionately harmed by poor housing?
- Are property owners aware of radon levels in their buildings, and have they been connected to resources to help them mitigate exposure?
- What supports are available to homeowners and renters who are struggling to pay their heating
- Are a variety of housing types and price points available in town? Are there housing options that are well suited for:
  - o Families with young children

- Single adults
- Senior citizens
- People with disabilities
- What can the Town do to support the development of more affordable housing?
- Is affordable housing served by public transportation? Is it within walking distance of stores and services?
- What supports exist for residents who want to homeshare?
- What is it like to be unhoused in our town? Are unhoused people being persecuted by neighbors and/or police? What can the Town do to help unhoused residents feel seen, valued, and supported in our community?

# Social Inclusion & Sense of Community

Social inclusion represents a vision for a "society for all" in which every person has rights, responsibilities, and an active role to play. Creating accessible and welcoming spaces for people of all abilities and identities yields dramatic benefits for mental health and overall quality of life, and is therefore a critical step in creating and sustaining healthy communities. In small communities, social ties can be very strong, but those ties are also often accompanied by strong social pressure to conform. That pressure emerges in mostly unspoken ways, and often results in exclusion of and discrimination against residents. When exclusion becomes the norm/expectation (usually unspoken, sometimes overt) in a community, everyone ultimately suffers.

- Are parks, streets, and other public spaces accessible to those with disabilities?
- Who comes and who doesn't come to community wide meetings or events? Why might people choose <u>not</u> to participate?
- What can the Town do to build community amongst residents who come from different backgrounds, in ways that acknowledge and honor our differences?
- What are the spaces in town where people can gather?
- How much of the community's diversity is reflected in the makeup of the Selectboard, Town staff, and other local decision-making bodies?
- What systems are in place to support grassroots mutual aid efforts in the community? How do neighbors find out about each others' needs, and how do they spread the word and recruit help when help is needed?

# Substance Misuse Prevention and Response

Substance misuse is a significant challenge in all communities, large and small. The impacts of individual behaviors and choices ripple out to affect household members, neighbors and friends, and ultimately the rest of the community. When one person is struggling, we all struggle. Those who are in recovery need community support to achieve their goals, and their success ultimately benefits everyone.

## **Questions for Reflection:**

- Does the Town allow age-restricted substances in any public spaces or events where they might trigger those who are in recovery or expose youth to unhealthy behaviors?
  - o Does the Town have a smoke-free/vape-free ordinance for public spaces and events?
  - Is there signage to inform residents and visitors of restrictions on substance use in public spaces?
- How close are retailers of age-restricted substances to sensitive community spaces like schools, libraries, daycares, playgrounds and recreational fields, community centers, and recovery centers? Could zoning be used to establish buffer zones?
- What supports are available to people who are struggling with substance misuse? What barriers to access might exist?
- Does the Town regulate the discharge of odors (e.g., smoke) beyond the property line?
- What can be done to raise awareness of the impacts of substance misuse, and the recovery resources available?

Keep in mind that health-related Town Plan language doesn't have to be restricted to a health chapter. Many other elements of a Town Plan also have an impact on health. Health considerations can be

integrated into many chapters, including for example Transportation, Housing, Natural Resources, Community Facilities and Services, etc.

When developing goals, policies and recommendations for a plan, remember:

- A GOAL represents the state of affairs that a plan is intended to achieve. A POLICY is an expression of how to meet a goal. A RECOMMENDATION is a means by which to implement a policy, through an action by a person or group.
- Goals and policies are more likely to become reality when concrete recommendations are developed for each policy, and when implementation logistics (timelines, costs, responsible parties, etc.) are thought through and documented.

- Health Impact Assessments (HIAs): HIAs are a tool that can help communities, decision makers, and practitioners make choices that improve public health through community design. HIA is a process that helps evaluate the potential health effects of a plan, project, or policy before it is built or implemented. HIA brings potential positive and negative public health impacts and considerations to the decision-making process for plans, projects, and policies that fall outside traditional public health arenas, such as transportation and land use. An HIA provides practical recommendations to increase positive health effects and minimize negative health effects. HIAs are flexible and can range from simple to complex, depending on the project or policy being evaluated. Vermont Department of Health Offices of Local Health may be able to assist Towns with conducting HIAs.

## **Town Ordinances to Support Health & Wellness**

The Health Chapter may include recommendations to pass ordinances that support healthy communities. Examples of such ordinances include:

## Alcoholic Beverage Control Ordinance:

Pass an ordinance prohibiting people from consuming or possessing opened containers of alcoholic beverages in public places.

### **Smoking/Vaping Ordinance:**

Pass an ordinance prohibiting the use and disposal of tobacco, tobacco substitute, and cannabis products and equipment on town-owned land.

#### Advertisement Ordinance:

Pass an ordinance establishing limits on retail advertising. Sign ordinances must be content-neutral, meaning the regulations cannot be based on the content of the sign, and the regulations must apply equally to all businesses. Such ordinances can serve a dual purpose of preserving the rural character of a town while protecting youth and vulnerable populations from advertising that encourages substance use. Ordinances can regulate the number, size, height, and placement of signs, types of signs (e.g., blinking lighted signs), as well as limit the amount of window space covered by signage (e.g., 10%).

### Retail Location/Density

Pass a zoning ordinance restricting the location and/or density of retailers of age-restricted products such as alcohol, tobacco, vaping products, and cannabis.
