Strong Flood Regulations Can Lead to Safer Communities

All towns in our region have flood hazard regulations. These regulations help to ensure that any development in mapped flood zones is carried out in a way that reduces or eliminates future damage to structures from flood events. In Vermont, we are beginning to see more frequent and severe rain and flood events, such as the flood event this past July. As these events become more common, the risk to development located in flood zones increases, which can lead to loss of life and significant economic impacts for homes and businesses.

Fortunately, towns have an opportunity to take action to mitigate future damages to buildings and infrastructure, as well as lower the safety risks for residents living in mapped flood zones. While FEMA sets the minimum requirements for flood regulations, towns should choose to enforce higher standards that place additional measures on new and substantially improved development. As an example, FEMA requires that structures in the floodplain be built to the Base Flood Elevation (BFE). This means that a structure's lowest floor is at the same height as the base flood, essentially the equivalent of having floodwater at your doorstep. Towns can and should require that new and substantially improved structures be built one or (preferably) two feet above the BFE. With the impacts of climate change and the movement of our rivers and streams over time, relying on FEMA's minimum flood standards can put new and existing structures at unnecessary flood risk and can lead to high repair costs or buyouts down the road. MERP Municipal Building Energy Assessments Awarded to 22 Towns

As of September 28th, 22 of TRORC's 30 towns (plus Newbury Village) have been awarded energy assessments for their municipal buildings through the <u>Municipal Energy Resilience Program (MERP)</u>. TRORC has been promoting the MERP program and assisting towns with their applications for several months. The assessments will be conducted throughout the fall and into the winter. Applications for the assessments remain open until October 31st, 2023. The state will continue to award assessments until funding is exhausted.

MERP is a multi-phase program that aims to help towns reduce emissions while saving money on their utility bills. The energy assessments will provide towns with valuable information on a given building's energy use and present options for retrofit projects that will help improve the building's energy efficiency. Having an assessment is a prerequisite to apply for a MERP project grant of up to \$500,000 when applications open this winter. Approximately 70 - 80 project grants will be awarded statewide.

2023 VTrans HSIP Small Scale Local Safety Grant Awards

Congratulations to the following towns on their successful awards from the first ever round of VTrans Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Small Scale Local Safety Grant program with 100% state share (no local match): Fairlee, Granville, Hartland, Strafford, Wells River, West Fairlee and Woodstock. TRORC is proud to have assisted all of these towns in applying for this exciting new program.

The intent of the Small Scale Local HSIP Grant is to improve safety on local roadways and provide construction funding only. Eligible projects may be combinations of any of the following facilities: signage, striping, clearing hazardous trees in right of way or installing breakaway devices. VT Legal Aid for Disaster Recovery Assistance

Vermont Legal Aid has established a <u>very helpful website</u> with information and contacts for those seeking disaster assistance, including the handling of appeals.

The website lists benefits, recovery programs, and common legal problems that can arise after flooding. <u>If you live</u> in <u>Vermont, contact VT Legal Aid with any questions.</u> Tell them if your problem is due to the flooding disaster. If they cannot directly help you, they will refer you to other resources that can.

Deadlines to note:

ASAP — If you have insurance, contact your home/renter/flood/car insurers and file a claim because FEMA will need documentation of what insurance will not cover. Also apply for help from FEMA at the same time.
September 29, 2023 — Apply for Disaster Unemployment Assistance by this date — for all affected counties.
October 12, 2023 — Apply for FEMA assistance by this date. This is a new deadline — but don't wait to apply!
October 12, 2023 — If you apply for a SBA loan, apply by this date.
60 days — Appeal any FEMA decision within 60 days of the date on the decision letter.

Cornerstone Creative Community Program Updates

TRORC's <u>Cornerstone Creative Community (3CVT)</u> program closed the summer by collaborating with community organizations to bring the film "Utica: The Last Refuge" to the Upper Valley. The film is about immigration and inclusivity, how refugees positively impact local economies, and all the struggles they face. It directly relates to opportunities in the Upper Valley to be more welcoming and inclusive, through housing, childcare, transportation, food access, and more. In partnership with the Green Mountain Economic Development Corporation (GMEDC) and Mount Ascutney Regional Commission (MARC), and the Vermont Arts Council, 3CVT aims to foster a resilient creative economy throughout East-Central Vermont by providing direct support to small businesses and hosting events that promote the creative sector.

Working Communities Challenge Updates

TRORC is a partner on the Working Communities Challenge with the White River Valley Consortium (WRVC).

The Working Communities Challenge advances local collaborative efforts that build strong, healthy economies and communities in northern New England's rural towns, regions, and smaller cities. With a focus on economic opportunity for communities and residents with low incomes, this unique three-year grant competition is supported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, State Government, national and local philanthropy, and private sector employers.

WRVC is a collaboration of 14 towns near the White River in Central-Eastern Vermont, created to address challenges that occur due to limited staff capacity at the town level.

The WRVC's first effort focuses on increasing housing for entry-level workforce and beginning entrepreneurs, which is essential to retaining young people in our communities, providing a high quality of life, stimulating local economies, and attracting new residents.

TRORC is among the collaborators in the WRVC organizing a series of facilitated conversations with people of varying generations within the same community. The goal of these talks is to develop relationships and understanding that participants can later bring to bear on addressing community challenges like housing. The process was developed with the expertise of Beth Tener of New Directions Collaborative, a New England-based consulting firm. The events were piloted in Tunbridge and Royalton, and will continue throughout the consortium.

The Town of Bradford is wrapping up the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) update process. The 2023 draft LHMP will be available to read on the Bradford town website, and a paper copy will be available in the Bradford Town Office.

Local Hazard Mitigation Plans are part of an effort by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to reduce damage from foreseeable natural and human-caused hazards. Examples of projects in local plans include increasing culvert sizes, regulating flood hazard areas, stabilizing landslides, and tree trimming near power lines. The Planner will be responsible for individual projects, as well as assisting other planning staff. General planning duties include writing comprehensive plans, hazard mitigation plans, zoning and subdivision bylaws; grant writing and management; and natural resource planning.

Special BONUS Round of Funding for the Downtown and Village Center Tax Credit Program!

In January 2024, during this special round of funding, additional state income tax credits will be competitively available to projects that enhance the historic character and improve building safety of older and historic commercial and community buildings in these designated communities. Funding supports general rehabilitation and code compliance work. The program also funds flood mitigation upgrades and exterior façade improvements. In response to the July 2023 floods, projects seeking Flood Mitigation Credits will be prioritized for funding in January.

Applications for the next round of tax credits are due Monday, January 8, 2024.
